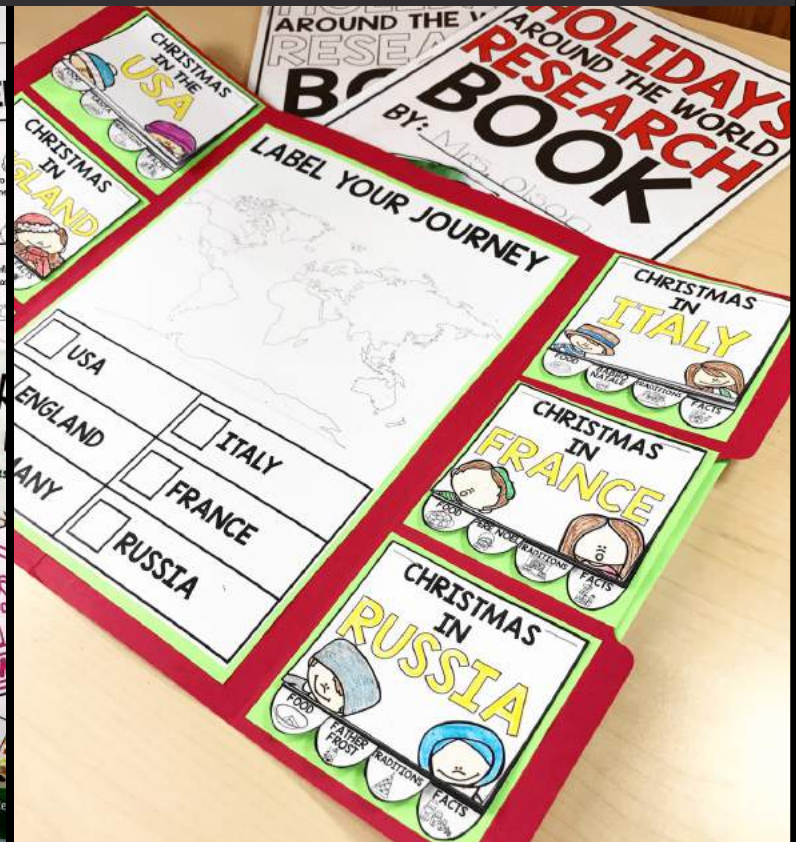

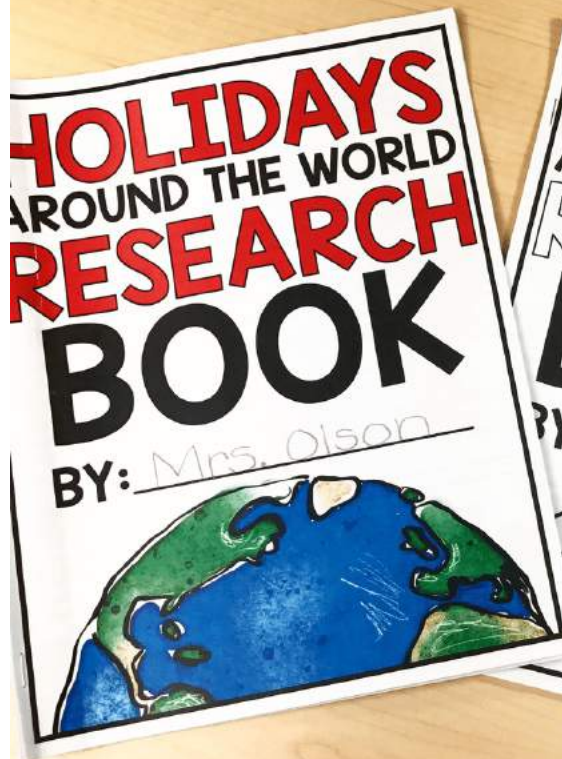

USA FACT SHEET

SANTA CLAUS

A lot of families go to church or mass on the night before Christmas. Some families go around neighborhoods caroling to other people. Before going to bed on Christmas Eve, a lot of families read the story *Night Before Christmas*.

FUN FACTS
• Homes across the United States are often decorated with wreaths, garlands, yard decorations and Christmas lights.
• Some Americans use popcorn to dress an string to help decorate their Christmas tree.
• Many Americans will go to church to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas. Many churches have special services.

USA FACT SHEET

GERMANY FACT SHEET

CHRISTKIND
Christkind is believed to be the one to deliver gifts to the little boys and girls in Germany. Children never see the Christkind in person and parents tell them that the Christkind will not come and bring presents if they are curious and try to spot it. In Germany, the family enters the living room, where the Christmas tree has been put up, and open the presents.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Advent is celebrated in Germany. Advent is the 24 days leading up to Christmas. They have Advent wreaths and Advent calendars. The Advent calendars are usually made of cardboard and have 24 small windows or flaps. One of these are opened each day leading up to Christmas. Behind each window is candy or a small toy.

FUN FACTS
• The Christmas Tree is very important in Germany. The most famous German decorations are glass ornaments.
• Children leave letters on their windowsills for Christkind. Sometimes the letters are decorated with glue and sprinkled with sugar to make them sparkle.
• German people make beautiful gingerbread houses and cookies.

ENGLAND FACT SHEET

FATHER CHRISTMAS
Father Christmas is the name of Santa Claus in England. The Santa tradition in England is very similar to the United States. He is often shown wearing a long red hooded gown trimmed with white fur. After the 1880s new customs were made and Father Christmas was known to deliver presents during the middle of the night for boys and girls.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
In England it is tradition for children to write a letter or wish list to Father Christmas on Christmas Eve. They toss the letters into the fireplace and it is said that their wishes go up the chimney to Father Christmas. After dinner on Christmas, the family gathers in the living room to listen to the Queen of England deliver a message over radio and television.

FUN FACTS
• The mistletoe started in England. It is believed that in slaving underneath a mistletoe they receive a kiss.
• Another tradition started by the people of England, and used cards to people they love.
• Some families have two Christmas trees in their home, one for the tree as a family.

ITALY FACT SHEET

BABBO NATAL
Italy's version of Santa Claus is called Babbo Natale. In Bologna is the name of the old woman who delivers gifts to the children. Babbo Natale is gaining popularity and is becoming more popular and gift giving on Christmas Day is becoming more common. Babbo Natale wears a red cloak with white trim. He delivers presents to the children's stockings which are hung in homes.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
The Christmas season lasts for 3 weeks in Italy. During this time children go from home to home singing Christmas songs. In Italy, children wait until January 6th to open their presents. Christmas is a very religious holiday for people in Italy. Most families celebrate Christmas by attending and getting involved with their church.

FUN FACTS
• When Italians return from church they might have a slice of Italian Christmas cake called Panettone which is a dry, fluffy sponge cake.
• The Christmas celebrations start eight days before Christmas with special prayers and church services.
• Some families have a Crippo (or Yule Log) which is burned through the Christmas season.

FRANCE FACT SHEET

PERE NOEL
In France, Santa Claus is called Pere Noel. Sometimes children call him Pape Noel or Daddy Christmas. He wears a red cloak with a hood trimmed in white fur. He travels with a team of reindeer and has a workshop at the North Pole. When he delivers presents to the children, he places them in the children's shoes which are placed near the fireplace. Presents are traditionally small such as candy and small toys.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
In France, Christmas is called Noel, which means "the good news". Some people burn a log in their homes from Christmas Eve until New Year's Day. On Christmas Eve, children leave their shoes by the fireplace to be filled with gifts from Pere Noel. In the morning they also find that sweets, fruit, nuts and small toys have been hung on the tree.

FUN FACTS
• People of France love nativity scenes. Most homes display a manger and gnat and it is set up around the Eiffel Tower during Christmas time. In that area there are little huts set up to celebrate the very beginning of Christmas Day.

RUSSIA FACT SHEET

FATHER FROST
Father Frost is the Slavic version of Santa Claus. Some people call him Old Man Frost. His granddaughter, Snegurochka, is his helper. She wears long silver-blue robes and a furry cap. Father Frost wears a fur coat that goes down to his feet, a fur hat, and carries a long magic staff. He travels in a frolic, which is a sleigh that is pulled by three horses. Father Frost delivers presents to children on New Year's Eve.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
The official Christmas and New Holidays in Russia last from December 31st to January 10th. Some people fast (don't eat anything) on Christmas Eve, until the first star has appeared in the sky. Following the meal, prayers might be said and people then go to the midnight Church services. They often don't wash the dishes until they get home from church—sometimes not until 4:00 am.

FUN FACTS
• Russians tell the story of Babushka who is an old woman who met the wise men on their way to see Jesus.
• Common gifts during the Christmas season in Russia include nesting dolls and Russian lacquer boxes.
• A traditional Christmas meal consists of 12 dishes which represent the 12 apostles.

NETHERLANDS FACT SHEET

SINTERKLAAS
In the Netherlands, Santa Claus is referred to as Sinterklaas and he brings presents to the children of the Netherlands on December 5th. Sinterklaas travels in a ship and arrives in the Netherlands on the second Saturday of November. The children of the Netherlands are told that there is a book with a record of everything they have done in the past year and good children get presents while bad children will be punished and taken to Spain for a year.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Sinterklaas is a huge part of the holiday season in the Netherlands so many of the family traditions center around him. Children are known to leave carrots for the reindeer in return for gifts that are placed in their shoes. Another tradition that occurs at Sinterklaas parties and at schools is that everyone's names are put into hats and everyone picks another person's name, then they have to make a surprise present for that person.

FUN FACTS
• On the evening that Sinterklaas arrives in the Netherlands, children leave a shoe out by the fireplace or sometimes a window and sing Sinterklaas songs.
• In Dutch Happy/Merry Christmas can be said as 'Zig Kerstfeest'.
• In many families in the Netherlands, children are told that Sinterklaas and Zwarte Piet make a weekly visit, so the children leave their shoe by the fireplace or window every Saturday until the main Sinterklaas party on 5th December.

BRAZIL FACT SHEET

Papai Noel or Father Noel
Papai Noel or Father Noel is the gift-bringer in Brazil. According to legend, Papai Noel lives in Greenland. When he arrives in Brazil, he wears summer clothing due to the summer heat. Papai Noel will arrive carrying a bag full of gifts. He leaves gifts for every good child on Christmas Day. Children will also lay out a sock for Father Noel and he will exchange it for a gift.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
The Christmas Eve meal is served at around 10 pm. At exactly midnight, people greet each other wishing everyone a Happy Christmas and then exchange presents. In Brazil, Christmas Day lunch is also special and after lunch they go visiting friends and relatives. Families will spend time setting up a nativity scene or "presépio" to honor baby Jesus. Fireworks go off in the skies over the cities. Families attend church at midnight called "Midnight Mass."

FUN FACTS
• It is very hot at Christmas time in Brazil so many people go to the beach.
• There is folk dancing and singing until January 6, which is called "Three Kings Day".
• Huge Christmas "trees" of electric lights can be seen in the major cities.

FACT SHEETS



MEXICO FACT SHEET

SANTA CLAUS
Santa is not nearly as popular in Mexico as he is in the United States. However, in the northern states of Mexico Santa Claus "Santa Claus" brings children big presents and the "Reyes Magos" bring the small presents in January.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
One of the most common traditions in Mexico are Posadas. Families celebrate these Posadas by decorating the outside of their houses with moss and paper lanterns. Children also celebrate these Posadas by going from house to house and singing. Another tradition at Christmas is to let the piñata, a decorated clay or paper-mâché figure hung from the ceiling or tree and filled with candy and sweets.

FOOD & DRINK
• tamales
• hot chocolate

• Ensalada Navideña

FUN FACTS
• In Mexico, Christmas is celebrated from December 12 to January 6.
• Nativity scenes, known as Nacimiento in Mexico, are more popular than Christmas Trees, though Christmas trees are growing in popularity.
• In Mexico, most people attend a midnight mass service which is called la Misa del Gallo or "the rooster's mass," and of the mass they love the most.

AUSTRALIA FACT SHEET

SANTA CLAUS
In Australia, Santa forgoes reindeer for kangaroos, or "Six White Boomers", which is a popular Christmas song. Santa also tends to give up his regular warm winter clothes for something more summer-friendly!

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Many families in Australia decorate their homes by hanging wreaths on their doors and putting up Christmas trees and lights inside their homes. They also decorate their homes with bunches of Christmas Bush, a native Australian tree. Carolling is also a very popular Christmas tradition in Australia.

FOOD & DRINK

FUN FACTS
• Every year, a famous Yacht race from Sydney to Hobart in Tasmania is held on Boxing Day.
• Since Christmas is during the summer in Australia, many words about snow and cold in traditional Christmas Carols are changed to special Australian words.
• Christmastime is during the summer-time in Australia, so it is always quite hot during the Christmas season which means some people go camping and there are often widespread bush fires.

SWEDEN FACT SHEET

JULTOMTEN
In Sweden, Santa is known as Jultomten or just Tomten (The Christmas Gnome). He buys presents and is often thought to be helped by gnomes which are called "Nissars".

FAMILY TRADITIONS
In Sweden, one of the biggest celebrations around Christmas is St. Lucia's Day on December 13th. St. Lucia's Day is celebrated by children dressing in white dresses with red sashes around their waists and a crown of candles on their head. Christmas Eve is also very important and is generally when the biggest feast of the season, a lunch buffet, is eaten.

FACTS
Swedish Happy/Merry Christmas is "God Jul".
• End of Christmas in Sweden is January 13th, when the Christmas Tree is taken down and all the leftover sweets are eaten.
• On Christmas Eve, many watch Donald Duck, every year, since 1959, on the Christmas Eve, the TV station TV1 shows the Disney special "All of Us to All of You".

CANADA FACT SHEET

SANTA CLAUS
In Canada, Santa Claus is very similar to the United States version. However, people in Canada believe that their country is home to Santa Claus, claiming that the North Pole has a Canadian zip code. Canadian children leave stockings by the fireplace, ready for Santa Claus to fill them with gifts.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Most Canadians decorate their homes with Christmas trees, lights, and stockings hung by the fireplace. Cookie baking parties are also very popular. People bring their favorite cookie recipe, bake the cookies, and exchange them with friends and family so that each party goes home with a variety of different cookies! Another tradition is the Santa Claus parade in Toronto, one of the oldest and largest Santa parades in the world!

FACTS
• Love to eat special Christmas candies called Barley Candy and Chicken.
• Canadian families eat a huge feast on Christmas Eve called Revelry after Christmas Eve mass and lasts well into the morning hours.
• In the Christmas season is January 6th, when people in Quebec have a called La Fête du Roi when they bake a cake with a bean in the center.

HANUKKAH FACT SHEET

WHAT IS IT?
Hanukkah or Chanukah, a Jewish holiday, is often referred to as the Festival of Lights. The holiday is celebrated with the lighting of the menorah, traditional food, games, and gifts. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights and eight days. It is observed anytime from late November to late December.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Most families who celebrate Hanukkah have a menorah. A menorah has eight branches with a ninth, main branch in the middle. Each branch has a candle that is lit each night. Families enjoy playing dreidel and eating oil-based foods such as doughnuts and latkes. Some families celebrate by giving a small gift on each night of the celebration.

FOOD & DRINK
• latkes
• doughnuts

FUN FACTS
• All around the world, Jews celebrate Hanukkah with eight nights of festivities, including lighting of the menorah each night.
• Around 17.5 million oil-based doughnuts are eaten in Israel during Hanukkah.
• Throughout Hanukkah, each menorah burns through 44 candles, adding one candle each night, plus the "shamash" - the extra helper candle.

CHINESE NEW YEAR FACT SHEET

FAMILY TRADITIONS
The Chinese New Year is also sometimes known as the Spring Festival and celebrates the lunisolar Chinese calendar. The New Year Festival generally falls between January 21 - February 20, and occurs on the second new moon after the winter solstice. Traditions include large parades with floats and plenty of red lanterns, as well as a different specific traditional practice for each of the fifteen days of the Chinese New Year Celebrations. One common tradition is exchanging red envelopes of money, especially from married couples to younger kids.

FOOD & DRINK
• noodle soup
• dumplings
• various meat dishes
• boiled chicken
• turnip cakes

FUN FACTS
• For the Chinese New Year, each year is named after one of twelve animals, which is featured in the Chinese zodiac.
• In China, schools and businesses can close for the first few days of the new year, so that everyone can spend time with their families.
• During New Year celebrations, fireworks are set off, because it is thought that noise and lights will scare away any evil spirits for the coming months.

DIWALI FACT SHEET

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Every Autumn, people of the Hindu faith celebrate Diwali. Diwali is the Festival of Lights. Celebrations include many lights and oil lamps being lit throughout the streets and people's houses, visits with family and friends, enjoying large feasts, and lots of shopping! During Diwali, it is also common to share traditional stories of good versus evil or darkness versus light, which is ultimately what Diwali is all about!

FOOD & DRINK
• Mithai
• Samosas
• crumbly doughnuts "balushahi"

FUN FACTS
• Before Diwali night, people clean, renovate, and decorate their homes and offices.
• Indian sweet treats, known as "mithai" are a cross between snack and dessert.
• Crescent moon shaped pastries are popular during the Diwali season. They are also known as "ghehna" or "sarang".

EGYPT FACT SHEET

Baba Noël (Father Christmas)
Children hope that Baba Noël will climb through their window and leave them some presents. Children will leave a plate of Kahlout for Baba Noël. Children are given El'aidia, a feast gift that has a small amount of money to buy sweets, toys and ice cream.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Advent is celebrated in Egypt. It is the days leading up to Christmas which is in January 7th. Families have a special diet of those days of only vegetables. On Christmas Eve, families church that begins at 20:30pm and ends at midnight. After church, people go home and eat a big meal. A favorite dish soup which is lamb soup with bread, rice, and garlic. Very few people celebrate Christmas in Egypt.

FOOD & DRINK
• Fatta soup (Lamb soup)
• meat
• eggs
• butter
• kahlout (sweet sauce)

FUN FACTS
• Homes are decorated with lights and Christmas trees.
• Churches are decorated with special lamps and candles.
• The weather in Egypt during this time is warm or hot and the nights are cool.
• People sing praise songs on Saturday nights during Advent before church services.

KWANZAA FACT SHEET

WHAT IS IT?
Kwanzaa is a celebration that honors the African heritage in the African-American culture. It is observed from December 26th to January 1st. It's celebrated with a feast and gift-giving. Kwanzaa has seven core principles.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Families celebrate Kwanzaa by decorating their homes with art, colorful African cloth, and the women wear koftans and fresh fruit. Children are included in Kwanzaa ceremonies and take pride in showing and giving respect and gratitude to their ancestors.

FOOD & DRINK
• rice
• slow
• grits

FUN FACTS
• Black, red, and green are the Kwanzaa colors. Black for the people. Red for the unity. Green for the rich land of Africa.
• Kwanzaa is not a religious holiday and is mainly celebrated in the United States.
• Kwanzaa is rooted in the African culture, however, people from all racial and ethnic backgrounds are welcome to join the celebration.

IRELAND FACT SHEET

SAN NIOCLÁS
In Ireland, Santa Claus is known as San Níoclás or Daidí na Nollag, otherwise known as Father Christmas. Children hope that Santa will visit on Christmas Eve and leave presents for Christmas morning. Children leave mince pie for San Níoclás and carrots for Rudolph.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
In Ireland, families decorate their homes with Christmas trees and lights. Families attend Christmas Eve church service and light candles in their windows. Many people take a traditional swim in the sea on Christmas morning. Christmas dinner is a time of food and family. Turkey or goose is served with vegetables and potatoes. Christmas pudding, trifle pie, and Christmas cake are eaten for dessert.

FACTS
• The term Nollaig Shona Duit which means "Happy Christmas to you" is the term Nollaig Shona Duit which means "Happy Christmas to you".
• In Ireland, families provide service throughout the year such as firefighters.
• Christmas pudding is a sweet treat decorated with holly and berries.

JAPAN FACT SHEET

Santa-San and Hoteiohso
There are two gift bringers in Japan, Santa-san and Hoteiohso. Santa-san is similar to the Santa in the United States. Hoteiohso is a Japanese god of good fortune from Buddhism. Both are said to bring gifts to the children of Japan. They leave the gifts above the pillows of sleeping children because there is not room under their small family trees.

FAMILY TRADITIONS
Christmas Eve is spent with loved ones. Many will take long walks looking at the beautiful Christmas light displays and trees around the cities. They eat Fried chicken that is bought at KFC or Kentucky Fried Chicken. For dessert, they have Christmas Cake. The Christmas Cake is a sponge cake with white cream and strawberries.

FACTS
• Christmas Cake is a symbol of economic and national prosperity.
• In Japan are very small and can not hold a large Christmas tree so place a mini Christmas tree on a tabletop in the home.
• The New Year is celebrated more like a traditional Western Christmas. It is celebrated from December 31st to January 4th.
